## PARADISE CORNER

I am thinking about Christmas but writing this in July to be read in preparation for August. This is an occupational hazard for a pastor because pastors think about Christmas and Easter a lot. For me, though, the fact is I think about Christmas every time I drive my car. This is not because I have one of those pine-tree shaped air fresheners (which I don't). The reason I think about Christmas every time I drive my car is because my inspection stickers display "12/24" reminding me to get my car inspected before the end of December of 2024.

I could think that constant reminder will disappear after this year. To most it will. But, as a pastor who thinks in terms of the observations on our church's liturgical calendar the constant reminder won't actually disappear for guite a while.

Next year, my inspection stickers will display "12/25." (This is actually Christmas Day, which we forget because the norm in the United States replaces celebrating the Day with celebrating the Eve.) The next year, my inspection stickers will display "12/26." (This is Saint Stephen's Day—as in "Good King Wenceslas" who looked out "on the feast of Stephen"). The next year, my inspection stickers will display "12/27," which is Saint John's Day. (He gave us the Christmas gospel reading about the Word becoming flesh to dwell among us). The next year, my inspection stickers will display "12/28." (This is the commemoration of The Holy Innocents, who were the boys two years old and under in Bethlehem killed by Herod after he realized the Wise Men had tricked him.) 2029 will finally give this pastor a break from Christmas-related reminder in my car! (While still within the Twelve Days of Christmas, 12/29 is not an actual commemoration on our calendar.)

I find this humorous in a professionally profound way. One of my tasks as the spiritual leader of our congregation is to help us keep the spirit of Christmas alive beyond December 24. Part of my work is to help us to accomplish what Ebenezer Scrooge promised, "I will honor Christmas in my heart, and try to keep it all the year." I still work on this task even though it became clear that "Christmas in July" was an idea whose time came and went. (That's okay! Not every idea we try has to become a permanent fixture!) Even so, helping us keep the spirit of Christmas alive beyond December 24 is a task that I remember every time I drive my car—even in the summer.

My hope is this little article can help me accomplish that task by reminding us that what we celebrate at Christmas—and can celebrate all year long—is that God broke into our world in the small and unexpected form of a baby. Celebrating Christmas all year long can happen when we realize that God still breaks into our world in small and unexpected ways. I believe that is the task of spirituality. Spirituality is not hoping to experience God along a grand journey into infinite space. Spirituality is actually experiencing God in the small and unexpected ways all around us. Even inspection stickers can become reminders of the holy when viewed through the eyes of faith. It's a Christmas miracle—but in the summer!
